1.4 Feedback System:	 Formal feedback system from 3rd Year students is in place. Feedback needs to be properly utilized. Honours courses in some subjects are introduced, based on feedback

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2.2 Teaching-Learning & Evaluation: 2.2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile:	 Admission process is inclusive, transparent and student friendly. Online merit-based admissions since last year. Reservation policies are followed, as per Government policy. A good number of students are fire generation learners and are from

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms:	 As per the affiliating University, annual system and CBCS is followed. Internal tests are conducted from time to time. Grievance Redressal as per University norms.

Social and economic relevance be strengthened through placement and entrepreneurial activities.

Girls' common room is in place, but no boys' common room. No auditorium, hostels and gym facilities. Library has 5217 books, 2348 titles and 13 journals. Partially digitalized library, with open access, and OPAC, KOHA, INFLIBNET-NLIST facilities. Library space is not adequate. 14 computers, 7 printers, 1 scanner 3 Projectors, 2 copiers, LAN and Wifi facilities are provided. Computerization of Salary Accounting (COSA) is introduced. 1 Smart classroom and 1 Computer Centre initiated.
2.4.4 Maintenance of Campus Facilities:	 Maintenance through college committees and funds. Annual maintenance provision is yet to be created.

2.5.1 Student Mentoring and Support:	 Student mentoring system is in place, but needs to be more effective. Minority and Reserved category scholarships as per Government policy. Mechanism for preventing sexual harassment exists.
